Activation

• ARES emergency operations are activated (ACTIVATION LEVEL) by a request from Local Emergency Management Officials or other Served Agencies. The EC is authorized to activate personnel within their own County after the request is received.

• The EC communicates activation to all ARES members listed on their County roster. Activation may be by phone, text, radio or other method. The EC uses the ICS-211 to keep track of ARES personnel activated for the emergency. The DEC and SEC are notified of activation as soon as practical.

Activation

• The DEC and SEC may elect to place regions or the entire Section in ALERT or STANDBY status ahead of approaching severe weather, or on the anticipation of a communications emergency.

Activation

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LEVEL	Net Activity	Frequency	What to do:
Normal	None	Local	Normal day
Alert	None	Locally Assigned	Monitor in severe weather or during other community emergencies for possible net activation. Notify EC / DEC for availability. Prepare Equipment & Supplies.
Standby	Possible directed net by EC to coordinate available stations and needs if activated.	Locally Assigned	Monitor in severe weather or during other community emergencies for possible net activation. Equipment / Supplies are Ready.
Activation	Full-time NET	Locally Assigned	All members should check-in to NCS and expect to handle assignments or deployment.
EVENT	Full-time NET	Locally Assigned	All members should check-in to NCS and expect to handle assignments or deployment.

ARES CONNECT

- National database for ARES volunteers.
- The new "National Standard"
- Up to the minute reporting of active members, activities, and participation.
- ECs and DECs can:
 - Manage their active rosters (DO <u>NOT</u> DELETE ACCOUNTS!!!)
 - Create events
 - Communicate en mass to your members (email only, ARRL currently assessing cost for including text feature)
 - Log hours

Training

- Training is <u>REQUIRED</u>.
- ARRL Courses
 - EC-001: Intro to EmComm (Online, 45 hours over 9 weeks)
 - EC-016: EmComm Management (Online)
- FEMA Courses
 - Online
 - ICS-100c, ICS-200c, ICS-700b, ICS-800c
 - Classroom
 - ICS-300, ICS-400
- Others as needed or specified by agency:
 - Skywarn
 - CERT
 - American Red Cross

Training

- Three levels of participation
- Level One
 - Entry level with no training
 - Progress through ARRL EmComm
 - Progress through FEMA ICS courses
- Level Two
 - "Standard" level for ARES Participants
- Level Three
 - Complete ICS-300, ICS-400
 - Qualifies for Leadership positions
 - EC, DEC, ASEC, and SEC

Qualification


- Training qualifies members to do what?
- Level One
 - Can perform most duties outside of an EOC. (Stormspotting, damage assessment, comm operator at shelters/NGO comm centers)
 - Target goal Level Two in ONE (1) year.
- Level Two
 - Normal participation level
 - Able to access most sites and EOCs (<u>IF ALLOWED BY AGENCY</u>)
- Level Three
 - Full access as authorized by AHJ.
 - Qualified for ARES Leadership.

Certification

- ARRL will provide a basic ID.
 - Serves to recognize your affiliation with ARES Nationally.
 - Indicates your level of training completed.
 - <u>DOES NOT</u> confer site access.
- AHJ (Athority having jurisdiction) granted ID.
 - Confers access to EOC, Command Center, TOC, TAC, scene etc.
 - Issued by AHJ (they giveth and can taketh away)
 - AHJ may have additional requirements (background check, security clearances, etc.)
