

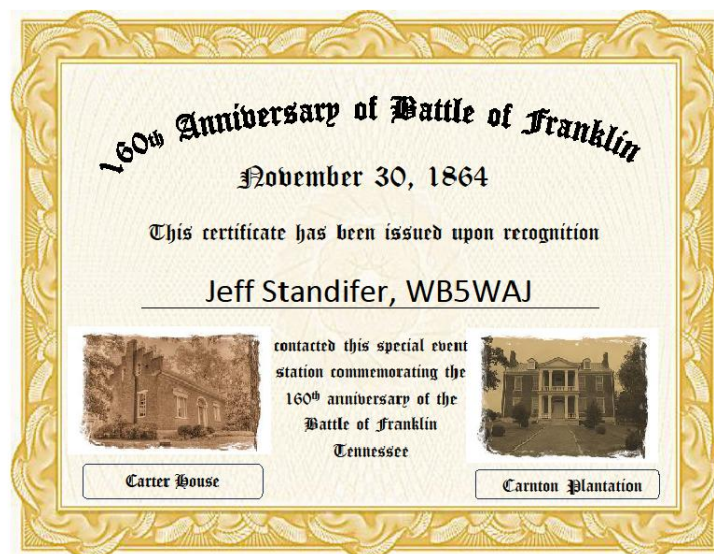
160th Anniversary of the Battle of Franklin

The Battle of Franklin, fought on November 30, 1864, was a significant engagement in the American Civil War between the Confederate Army of Tennessee, led by General John Bell Hood, and the Union Army, commanded by Major General John Schofield. Taking place in Franklin, Tennessee, it was part of Hood's desperate attempt to disrupt Union supply lines and reclaim Tennessee.

Hood ordered a massive frontal assault against the Union forces, who were entrenched in fortified positions around Franklin. The Confederate soldiers faced intense artillery and musket fire, resulting in devastating losses. Despite multiple charges, they failed to break the Union lines, suffering one of the highest casualty rates of the war. By the end of the battle, over 6,000 Confederate soldiers were killed, wounded, or captured, severely weakening Hood's army. The Union forces ultimately retreated to Nashville, where they defeated Hood in the subsequent Battle of Nashville, ending Confederate hopes in the Western Theater.
